



The First Reading: 2 Timothy 2:8-15

Remember Jesus Christ, raised from the dead, a descendant of David—that is my gospel, for which I suffer hardship, even to the point of being chained like a criminal. But the word of God is not chained. Therefore I endure everything for the sake of the elect, so that they may also obtain the salvation that is in Christ Jesus, with eternal glory. The saying is sure:

If we have died with him, we will also live with him; if we endure, we will also reign with him; if we deny him, he will also deny us; if we are faithless, he remains faithful—he cannot deny himself.

Remind them of this, and warn them before the Lord that they are to avoid wrangling over words, which does no good but only ruins those who are listening. Do your best to present yourself to God as one approved by him, a worker who has no need to be ashamed, rightly explaining the word of truth.







As we move back to our Fellowship Hall for months of worship, I thought that we really needed something visual to help us worship and to inspire us every Sunday. I quickly contacted parishioner and local artist Jane Runyeon about this because she is a brilliant artist and has helped us enhance our worship spaces in the past, most notably by designing the stained glass in our chapel. We consulted for months on what might look and work best. The result is the beautiful tapestry IXTHYS. I can't thank Jane enough for once again making a lasting contribution to our worship at Christ Church. Here are Jane's reflections on the inspiration and meaning of the stained glass tapestry. (Fr Bryce)



IXTHYS Christ Episcopal Church Tapestry for the Parish hall designed by Jane Runyeon

This tapestry offers a profound theological meditation on Christ and the faith of the Church, interwoven with historic Christian symbols. Through its interplay of color, line, and sacred imagery, it invites both contemplation and worship. At the center stands the cross, a living sign of suffering transformed into glory. Its placement not only recalls Christ's crucifixion and triumph over death but also guides the eye toward the vivid symbolism of the chalice, a reminder of eternal life. The ichthys (fish) and chi rho further express the ancient foundations of Christianity. Together, these emblems create a unified vision that evokes the harmonious joy and celebration of our Lord, Savior, and Redeemer.



Incarnational Transformation An Interview By the Very Rev. Julia McCray Goldsmith

chose "Tell Out My Soul" as a hymn for my ordination two years ago. It's such an important biblical text and prayer, and it has a special meaning for me as a Latina. In Latin America we are devoted to Mary but don't necessarily pray the Magnificat so much. It's such a statement of hope, abundance and strength, though. Mary strengthens me.

While I was in formation for the priesthood, I used to pray to God to stop me if I was taking the wrong path. Ordination felt like a radical transformation: it required a lot of trust, just like being the mother of God was an act of trust for Mary. Growing up in Costa Rica, a nun in my Catholic school said Mary always brings us to places and then takes us away from places. She moved in faith, and so have I.

I came to the US to study music at Indiana University. When I was finishing my bachelor's degree I found myself pregnant. I couldn't go back to CR because I would have been subjected to so much shame. But even though it was really hard to continue, people surrounded me and became family to me and my daughter. I experienced more of the same love and solidarity at Christ Church Cathedral in Indianapolis, which was my very first professional job as a musician.

Music has the power to transform our communities. I'm pretty sure that whatever Good News I bring has to do with Latin American music. Latino people have a gift to share culture and spirituality. It's an incarnated spirituality that takes the form of hospitality, sharing meals, motherhood, community, and solidarity. It's different from European music in that it's an oral tradition learned by ear. That's incarnational, too: the music is told through our voices and learned through our ears.


